
Approved volunteer activities are:

#### Friends of Anne Kolb Volunteer Meeting Minutes- January

Election of officers: All officers were present and unopposed. All agreed to continue if elected. Joern Curtis was on conference call to have a voting quarem: All were reinstated unanimously. PRESIDENT; Rockell A. VICE PRESIDENT: Joanne R. TEASURER: Margaret C. RECORDING SECRETARY: Kathy H.

Margaret gave the treasurers report and a copy of details is with the financial records. There is \$32,581.94 in the account.

Margaret showed us a picture of a donation collection device which seems to entice people to give. It is about \$400 to purchase. We will discuss and decide at the next meeting.

Margaret is continuing to investigate a way that we can use charge cards for gift-cart purchases. Rockell is going to help her.

\$5.00 dues were collected and may be submitted for 2022.


> Herons By Bob Goldberg

How much wood could a woodchuck chuck, if a woodchuck could chuck wood? How much hair does a heron have, If a heron had some hair?

We know the answer to the above riddle, because we are well aware that the heron sports feathers rather than hair. But do we know the six that are residents in our ecosystem? They are: the great blue, black crowned, yellow crowned, little blue, green, and tricolor. They differ from their cousins, the egrets, in the color of their legs. Egrets may be a type of heron, but they should not be combined with them. The heron is unique in the yellow color of its legs with some species having lime-green or blue-green legs. Those of the egret are dark in color. Some breeding species can display changes in leg color. Herons are confused with egrets because they are in the same family, and the biological differences are missing. Most birders have treated them as separate. One big difference is height. Typically, egrets are smaller.

Herons come in a variety of sizes, from gigantic (great blue), to medium (tricolor), to small (little blue). The coloration may be confusing, as some are totally different when juvenile. When young, the little blue is white and the yellow crowned is brown. All display notable adult color differences and are easily identified in the field. They are shallow water hunters and wade slowly, or stand like statues, waiting for prey, such as small fish, worms, or frogs to approach. A lightning like thrust with powerful neck muscles stabs the prey with its pointed bill. The prey is then maneuvered by the bill in preparation for swallowing.

Herons are fortunate to have few natural predators in their habitats. Mammals, such as raccoons, opossums, and weasels are known to attack nests and devour eggs and nestlings, while leaving adults alone. The great blue, due to its size, has the fewest predators, but is prone to attack by hawks and eagles. Everything is food for something else. The Garden Guide reports that herons build nests purposely over locations that house alligators because alligators are efficient in controlling mammalian nest raiders. But watch out if an unlucky nestling falls from the nest. The protector becomes the antagonist. As cool as it is to observe herons in the field, they can be a pest to owners of ornamental fishponds. Herons have no concept of the value of goldfish or koi, and pond owners should take precautions to protect them.

Herons can be found on all continents except Antarctica and are always associated with water. Their estimated life span is 15 years and even longer if in captivity. They are carnivorous and superb hunters. Herons are prolific and not considered endangered. This may change if there is continued development of the wetlands for commercial or residential uses. In some cultures, they even are seen as messengers of God (Greenland and Africa). Have we underestimated them? Maybe. Enjoy bird outings with herons as a focus.




Great Blue Heron at Wakodahatchee








## Hanging around the Marina.

Red Mangroves are an ideal habitat for Lichens.

After our strong rains the yellow-orange patches of Lichens are very vibrant on the Red Mangrove prop roots. These patches are widespread on the roots and trunk, it is not actually part of its bark. Instead, you are seeing an ideal habitat for several crutose Lichens. Lichens consist of two parts: blue-green algae and fungus which co-exist on the prop roots and trunks. The fungus houses and provides protection while the blue-green algae photosynthesizes and provides food. The relationship between the fungus and algae is considered a form of controlled parasitism because the fungus acts a parasite on the algae, sometimes this is also called a symbiotic relationship. Lichens are often seen at Anne Kolb Nature Center because of the high density of Red Mangroves in our ecosystem. Lichens appear not to affect the health of the Mangroves in any way at all.
